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Headteacher's Introduction

Welcome back to the start of the second half of the summer term! It was fantastic to see the children come back in on Monday and pick right up from where they left off before half-term. One of my favourite times of the day is 8.50am when the doors open. There is a such a lovely buzz around the school as children come inside together and get ready to start their day of learning.

Remember, doors will always open at 8.50am - and children should be inside school ready for the register to be taken promptly at 9am. Children arriving after this time must enter the school via the front office where they will be marked as late.

Children arriving after 9.15am will receive an unauthorised absence mark in the register. Being persistently late before and after school is a safeguarding matter - and can lead to the issue of a fixed penalty notice.

Being on time for school teaches children an important lesson for life and builds good habits for their future. It is about enabling children to prepare for their day ahead. If it is sunny and hot, getting them to bring a sunhat and put on sun cream teaches them that preparatory routine for life. The same as if it is raining, being prepared with coats, hoods, hats and umbrellas teaches them to be ready for what is ahead.

And that really is the essence of school, it isn't just about reading, writing and maths. It is about preparing and readying children for the future so they are able to thrive in the modern world.

With the rapid advancement of technology and understanding of the world, there is a good chance many of our children will grow up to pursue careers that don't even exist yet. But habits like being on time and being prepared for the day ahead will always put them in good stead for whatever future path they choose to take.
